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Interviewing Helping Professionals: Social work/ Psychology at EWU By: Matio

MW: How did you get into your profession?

AMG: "As a kid I really enjoyed listening to stories. My grandparents would tell me stories about their previous experiences and I sorta viewed them as windows to the past that I can learn from. I did this because I was very interested in the mind and how it works. Then, as I started to get older I wanted to go to college and explore all different kinds of fields but the one thing that always stood out to me is the mind and how it works and how I could use that knowledge to help people."

MW: What are some of the upsides of your profession of being a therapist to you?

AMG: "I think some of the upsides of being a therapist is how rewarding it feels to offer people coping skills and see it being used to benefit their lives in a positive way. By giving people these skills I want to be able to make a difference in their lives and make it better because I view it as I'm a tool that is to be used to help them cope and feel better about the situations they seek therapy for."

MW: What would you consider some of the downsides of being a therapist?

AMG: "For me personally it's the risk of burnout. I feel like you take in so many emotions from your clients that you start to feel them as well. That's why I think it's important that just like they come to me about their issues that I go to therapy as well just so that I can cope and be ready to do my job and continue to take on those emotions and be able to make the patients feel better. This allows me to avoid the burnout because I'm also working to make sure I'm at my best when the moment arrives."

MW: What's something in your profession you wish you could change/make better?

AMG: "For me it's reducing the stigma surrounding therapy. I just want people to know that it doesn't mean you're crazy, it's just a place for you to open up and deal with your issues positively. Therapy is a safe place to talk to someone who is unbiased and can give you the help you need."

MW: What keeps you motivated?

AMG: "Wanting to set a great example for my siblings, learning as much as I can about techniques I can use to help people, and wanting to keep gaining experience through working with clients. The client's ability to be ability to be able to get through tough challenges makes it all worth it for me."

MW: What advice would you give to potential future therapists?

AMG: "To come in with a curiosity to know how the human mind works. Also, be open to learning and be kind to yourself if potential struggles arrive. And even more importantly get to know yourself and don't get torn down by what other people think because if it's really what you want to do then you should go for it."

How did you get Into Psychology?

" I started with an interest in high school and I had a lot of questions like why people do things that they do, why they think the why that they think, and act the way that they do? These questions arose in high school and I found them really interesting."

What is your experience working with adolescents and adults? How often are these experiences negative?

"I've worked with numerous adults in a number of different settings dealing with a myriad of issues including drug abuse and sexual assault. I would say that most experiences aren't negative but you do have to get a feel about where a person is coming from and trying to emphasize with them."

How do you establish rapport with your clients, and what strategies do you use to build trust?

" I think I like to listen and try see the world from my clients perspective and I try to understand the world as they see it which in turn helps me build rapport with them and trust because this process helps me help them."

What is an unpopular opinion about therapy that you agree with?

"I think I agree with the unpopular opinion that it's not always as accessible as it could be and it's difficult for people to afford it. Some people in tight financial situations are at an unfortunate disadvantage because many have difficult financial obligations that can stop them from receiving therapy because of the money it costs".

What advice would you give to someone who wants to pursue a professional career in therapy?

"First, I would say to talk to a lot of people in the field because everyone's different, I would also encourage them to get to know the different kind of jobs this profession provides, and then i would tell them to find a way to volunteer and be able to gain some experience because it always helps, and if someone is really serious about psychology I would also like to say it's a good idea to explore different cultures, beliefs, and experiences because you never know who will show up for therapy and what their personal problem may be and learning about the different cultures can help you better understand yourself and your own biases while also being able to figure out a way to help people in spite of them."

Dr. Beverly Carnes

Why did you choose a career as a sociologist?

"I chose a career in sociology because I like helping people. I like the fact that I can use it to empower others and I love the fact that I get to help others reach and realize their full potential."

What is the most rewarding part of being a sociology professor for you?

" I think the most rewarding part for me is seeing people be able to realize their passions. I also think it's very rewarding when they reach their goals of getting careers in sociology because it proves that I had a hand in making a difference in their lives and that means so much to me."

What have you found to be the best way to monitor the performance of your work and/or the work of others?

"I've found that I can monitor the performance of my work as a professor and the work of others by seeing my students' writing and their ability to be

persistent when things get difficult. This allows me to know if my students are getting anything out of my teachings and what I and they can do to improve in the future."

What would you say to be your greatest strength as a professor and as a person?

"I would say my greatest strength as a professor is that I'm able to teach my students from an experienced perspective which would allow my students to be able to get more information about sociology. I would say my career and experience in the workforce as a behavioral practitioner and as a worker at an hospice mental health facility is something I can use to give perspective on some of the things that can prove beneficial to aspiring youth who want more sociology information."

What qualities must someone exhibit to be able to do your job effectively?

"They would need a willingness to help others and the ability to be non judgemental. With these qualities and a masters degree in sociology of course they should be able to do what I do effectively."


Who Am I? By Norma A.Aguilar


