Through the months of Feburary and March we celebrate Black History Month and Womens History, we decided to shine some light and import Black women in history




Marie Van Brittan Brown was born on October 30,1922 in Queens,New York. She was a nurse and an inventor along with her husband she invented the first video home secuirty system in 1966. Her design involved three different peepholes pertaining to the size of adult or child. A camera would move up and down between the peepholes, that camera would then display on a monitor any where throughout the house of the individual.



Valerie Thomas was born on Feburary 8,1943 in Baltimore,Maryland. She is a scientist and inventor who worked for NASA. She invented a form to trasmit 3D images and/or holograms. She also helped devleop software to convert scientific data that is captured by satillites. She was one of two women who worked at NASA at the time. She retired from NASA in 1955 and later on went on to earn her doctorate in 2004.NASA continued to use the technology for satillite apllications



Alice H. Parker was born in 1895 in Morristown, New Jersey. Her invention was the gas furnance in December of 1919. Her design invovled cool air entering the furnance and then conveyed through a heat exchanger which then released warm air through the ducts of each room. Alices' design was unique because it used nature gases instead of wood or coal which was what had been previously used for central heating.



Josephine Baker was born on June 3, 1906 in St.Louis Missiouri. She was a very successful dancer and took her success to France. Other than being a successdul dancer, during World War II she became a spy for the French resistance, she would inform them with valuable Nazi infromation to aid the war effort.



Shirley Chisholm was born November 30, 1924 in Brooklyn New York. She was an American politician and was the first Black Women to be elected to the United States congress . She also became the first black candiadate for a major-party nomination for President of the United States. She served seven terms in Congress

Chicago Police Department and Violence

As violence increases in our communities with gangs and police brutality students gathered information on how a Chicago police officer perceives violent occurrences and the effect it has on citizens while on duty. The officer under questioning will remain anonymous. The students who led the interview were **Giancarlo Medina**, Ulises Viramontes, Mario Guzman, Angel Sierra, and Mario Bernal. The questions and responses are as follows...

Question: As a police officer working in chicago what has been one of the biggest misconceptions about gang violence that you have seen in the media?

Response: That most gangbangers are misguided youth. Instead they're a well organized group that includes a well established structure including leadership, management and enforcers.

Question: Do you believe cutting funds out of the police department and putting the budget towards community based programs would help lower gang violence?

Response: no, from my experiences I haven't seen any type of community engagement or organizations that can affect any of the troubled If these troubled kids can be influenced

At home it would be difficult for an outsider organizer to have any effect on them long term. Defunding the police will only affect the law abiding citizens who seek the police, not the arrest rate.

Question: As a working police officer in Chicago did you ever experience gang violence while growing up, if so did that affect your decision to pursue a career?

Response: Yes as a teeneager I was chased in my vehicle several times.I can't say if they thought I was apart of a different gang or they were trying to rob me either way I feared for my life. I also lost a very close friend and that affected my choice of career. I felt that having this career would bring me closer to the family of my friend.

Question: Based off the experiences of your career, have you ever had any near death experiences due to gang violence and can you elaborate on that?

Response: I have not in relation to gang violence most of my experiences have dealt with gun violence. There are gun offenders who would rather be caught with a gun than without in fear of falling victim to gang violence. This becomes a safety risk for them and myself while I chase them while I'm guarding a firearm. Question: Based on your experiences have you seen children witness Gang violence? What is the most uncomfortable thing you have seen do they go through? **Response:** Any day you can watch city cameras and see kids running for their lives as they dodge bullets its a very sad event to witness. I personally witnessed a young boy get gunned down while being in the back seat of his mother's car and there to see him be taken to a hospital for treatment. Fortunately he made it that night but im unaware if he had long term effects. Word was that his mother was involving with gangs which took a toll on her child.

Question: If possible would you be able to answer what would solve Gang violence in a city like chicago? **Response:** I believe there is no way to get rid of gangs and gang violence. This is a working class city unless parents dont go to work and supervise their children 24/7, the youth will seek things to do with their friends.

Question: Do you have any old friends that became gang members and if so did you keep in touch with them and did they feel some way about your career?

Response: As stated before losing a close friend took a toll on me. I don't keep in contact with people who indulge in gang activity.

Question: Do you have any sympathy for those who were born into gangs?

Response: yes, i took part in a search warrant where several firearms were discovered and a 15 year old boy was taken into custody and he called his father on speaker phone to tell him he was arrested for a gun charge. His father's response was take it for the nation, meaning do it for the gang and stay quiet. **Response:** The starts at home have to discipling teachers job to its to educate.

Question: Moving on from police work you have also worked with canine. What was your role and your experience with CTA in various locations in which the trains would stop at?

Response: We were placed on the redline and mainly worked the redline, organge line, and green line. We were there because of gang activity and violence and majority of robberies were gang related.So my role was to prevent or detere those criminal individuals from committing such acts on the platform.

Question: What was the most common age range of the criminals or gangbangers you saw while working the CTA platforms?

Response: Majority were young and some with their parents. They'll be blowing me off calling me names at a young age. They don't see us

Question: What do you think can be done so that the police can have a better image to those who view you as enemies?

Response: The first thing would be the media and how they show us. They never show the good but only the bad so they have a story. We try to get officers more involve by doing activities with the kids sometimes.

Question: What do you think music has to do with gang violence?

Response: I believe music has to do alot with sending a message. If you grow up listening to a certain message by a artist you look up to the youth can be influenced. Question: Are there any other thoughts you would like to share on gang violence? **Response:** The education starts at home. Mental Health Act In regards to ensuring the mental health of students Illinois passed the Mental Health Early Action on Campus Act on August 9, 2019. The act requires both public colleges and universities to (a) to provide training and resources and peer support services to students regarding mental illnesses (b)to create collaborations with local mental health providers to increase services to students. Effective July 1, 2022 the MHEAC act provides that the General Assembly shall appropriate \$19,000,000 in Fiscal year 2023 for the purposes of this act, and the funds shall be distributed to the public colleges and universities.
